WHAT SHOULD **NOT** GO IN THE TANK?

The following materials have the potential to do great damage to your septic tank and drainfield. In order to maintain the health of your septic system, avoid flushing these materials down the sink or toilet.

Paper Products

Disposable diapers Paper towels Facial tissues Baby wipes Feminine hygiene products Cotton balls/swabs

Alternative disposal options:

These items should be thrown in the garbage. Paper towels can be composted if they do not have grease or chemicals on them.

Chemicals

Paint, paint thinner Solvents Automotive fluids Fuels Pesticides/Herbicides Fertilizers

Food Wastes

Animal fats and bones Grease Vegetable oil Coffee grounds Citrus and melon rinds Corn cobs Egg shells

Alternative disposal options: Animal fats/bones, grease and oil should be put in the garbage. The other items can be composted.

Household Products

Bleach Toilet disinfection tablets Harsh household cleaners Sanitizers Drain cleaners

Product alternatives:

Homemade cleaners with hydrogen peroxide and vinegar are very effective at killing harmful bacteria and won't damage your septic system. Google "natural cleaning recipes" for ideas.



Inert Materials

Dental floss Kitty litter Cigarette filters Bandages Hair Mop strings Lint Rags



Alternative disposal options: These items should be thrown in the garbage.

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NO medications should be flushed down the toilet/drain
